College and Area Information:

Eastern Arizona College's District Offices are located in Thatcher, Arizona, a beautiful rural area with easy access to arid as well as mountainous recreation. The College is located approximately 125 miles northeast of Tucson and 165 miles southeast of Phoenix. EAC is a comprehensive community college offering five associate degrees across nearly 50 programs of study. Eastern Arizona College is the oldest member of the Arizona Community College system and is fully accredited by The Higher Learning Commission.

Position Summary and Organizational Relationship:

The Associate Professor of Construction Trades reports to the Coordinator of Prison Programs. Funding for this position is contingent upon continuation of a contract with the Arizona Department of Corrections and continuation of this position/program within that contract. The selected candidate must be acceptable as an employee of the Arizona Department of Corrections Douglas Prisons.

Required Qualifications:

Required qualifications to effectively perform job. An equivalent combination of education, training, and experience will be considered.

- Five years verifiable occupational experience in Construction or related areas
- Must pass extensive background checks by the Arizona Department of Corrections
- Must pass pre-employment drug screenings as required by the Arizona Department of Corrections
- Ability to work effectively in a high-security setting with a diverse group of individuals
- Ability to effectively utilize computer programs and productivity tools for communication, record keeping, supplemental instruction, instructional preparation, etc.
- Must be willing and able to work a non-traditional schedule at Douglas Prison.

Preferred Qualifications:

- AAS degree or higher in related field of study.
- Ability to work and interact effectively with Arizona Department of Corrections staff, College personnel, and students and be able to deal with the challenges and stress of a high security environment
- Teaching experience in Construction and the ability to relate to and address all levels of student preparation
- Strong organizational and record keeping skills
- Experience working in a high security environment with an all-male student body.

Essential Functions:

- Teach incarcerated adult male students approximately 25 hours per week
- Adhere to a work schedule determined by the contracting agency that will include training days
- Teach to entry level proficiencies in construction math, blueprint reading, safety practices for industry, masonry, concrete work and carpentry
- Maintain true and accurate records reflecting student progress and achievement for all courses taught
- Conduct and report on classroom assessment
- Update course outlines, pre- and post-test and curriculum as needed
- Comply with all Arizona Department of Corrections policies and procedures as well as all District policies and procedures

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities:

May be representative, but not all-inclusive, of those knowledge, skills, and abilities commonly associated with the job.

- In-depth knowledge of construction trades including blueprint reading, construction math, concrete, masonry, carpentry.
- Familiarity with the Arizona Department of Corrections policies and procedures.
- Strong instructional and classroom management skills.
- Capability to work with a diverse group of individuals, including Department of Corrections staff and students.

- Ability to hear and understand student questions and communications in a classroom setting.

- The primary work setting is within correctional facilities, specifically the Arizona Department of Corrections. This environment is highly secure, with stringent access controls, surveillance, and a need for adherence to strict security protocols.
- Exposed to moderate noise levels.
